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Foreign Language Expression

Most of us in life have to do some type of public speaking. Whether it be at work, or in school, or even at family gatherings — speeches are a necessary part of life that most of us tend to avoid like the plague. But what if you enjoy speeches? Hearing the articulation of your words; the intonation of your voice; the powerful gestures

and movements with every breath you take. Are these some of the things that you enjoy? In English, it is hard enough to speak with confidence and conviction in everyday life, so why would someone voluntarily do it?

I recently had to judge a speech contest for the city of Kashiwa. It is a routine thing that happens every year, but for some reason this year was different. We had many more students this year than last year; I listened to about 42 speeches in all including recitation speeches. There were a few that stood out to me and I thought to myself, "why?" As I compared all of the speeches from that day, it occurred to me that the speeches that stuck out to me more were the ones that displayed more emotion. These emotional speeches that were delivered were believable. I found that with most of

the speeches that I saw however, had a disconnect between the text and the emotionality of the utterances. Most of the students, I realized, memorized their speeches verbatim but did not give an emotional response during their conveyance – it seemed more like a chore to them rather than excitement. But, for the few who drew my attention it was surefire way to get to the top of my list and to move onto the next round.

Last year, the winners of the very same speech contest came to Ichikashi to be tutored personally by the judges (Kevin and I). The boy I tutored was absolutely incredible; his pronunciation of English was almost impeccable and his rhythm and timing seemed effortless. I asked him how he prepared for the speech contest and he told me that he spent hours with an Assistant Language Teacher to prepare for the speech contest – and it showed; it truly showed.

While working with him, I got a sense of his understandability of English. He was able to do so well because he understood the text and what it was saying. That of course, I saw, was the chain reaction to his success. From his understandability to his pronunciation and rhythm – it was the entire package.

In conclusion, I feel, it is not a love of public speaking that people have but a passion; an emotional connection of what they are saying, what they are doing, and what they are believing.
