and many others on the exchange in this newsletter. Let me recap the two celebrations.

In the last nine months, TSCA and KIRA have celebrated our 50th Anniversary to the fullest. It all started last February when 46 delegates from Kashiwa visited Torrance to commemorate the signing of the original proclamation to become sister cities in 1973. TSCA's 50th committee started in the spring of 2021 to plan that four-day weekend. Early on, possible events were discussed, and what seemed a dream became a reality. New tours, that the delegates had never visited in previous anniversary years, included Southern California Regional Occupation Center and brigantine sailboat cruise out to sea from San Pedro Harbor. Even with the threat of rain, the biggest picnic in TSCA history was organized in Wilson Park that reunited hundreds of old friends from Torrance and Kashiwa. With the help of TOCA, a performance featuring past exchange delegates from both Torrance and Kashiwa was presented in the Armstrong Theater. That night was such a success it surpassed even our dream. Many volunteers made this an awesome celebration, but

I need to thank my faithful, hard-working committee that worked all or part of those twenty-four months: Mikko Haggott Henson, Hazel Taniguchi, Werner Willoughby, Lori Chong Eurich, Sumi Arnheim, Aileen Willoughby, Eleanor Jones, Wendy Ito, Mayoori Shetti, and Cindy Scotto. Our meetings lasted so long they morphed into potluck lunches. As February 2023 approached, many others stepped in when needed.

The 50th celebration concluded last month in Kashiwa when 43 Torrance delegates visited our sister city. Words cannot express our gratitude to their 50th committee for the time, effort and talent of organizing the activities with the City of Kashiwa. As in Torrance, we participated in the usual anniversary activities, but after planting the cherry tree in Furusato Park, we witnessed the unveiling of the gift that Mayor Chen presented to Mayor Ota in February, a directional sign post, in Japanese pointing towards Torrance. We also experienced new activities. We enjoyed the view from the Tokyo Tower, the one that resembles the Eiffel Tower. The delegation for the first time ever, walked down Torrance Street!! A great big THANK YOU to Mr. Kosai who organized the vision and the funding for the street where our exchange teachers live, named for their sister city. He made hundreds of pennants for each and every street in Torrance and hung them all along Torrance Street. It was so much fun looking for the street where we lived and pausing for a photo.


